I just wanted to provide you with a few updates on Dr. Leisha Emens work.

For over a decade Dr. Emens has worked in the research laboratory and the clinic to optimize a vaccination approach for the treatment and prevention of breast cancer. She developed a breast cancer vaccine that is manufactured solely at Johns Hopkins. It is designed to harness the power of dendritic cells to activate the immune system to identify and destroy tumors. With the vaccine as an accelerator to push the anti-tumor immune response forward, her trials to date have integrated the vaccine with standard breast cancer drugs like chemotherapy and Herceptin. She is now expanding her clinical research to test immune checkpoint blockade, a brand new and powerful approach to cancer treatment that relieves the brakes on the immune response to tumors. She is moving toward a very exciting treatment approach, combining the vaccine with immune checkpoint blockade. Here, simultaneously pushing the accelerator and stepping off the brakes should unleash the full power of the immune system to fight breast cancer. Dr. Emens is applying these same ideas to ovarian cancer, testing a vaccine specific for the ovarian cancer marker mesothelin. All of the clinical trials include discovery research, where the analysis of patient tumors and immune cells will lead to the development of new and more potent drugs to fight cancer. The powerful and unique feature of all immunotherapy is that it trains the immune system to "remember," so that it can continue to fight cancer long after active immunotherapy is complete.

We are so grateful for the staunch support from you and the foundation! Today, more than ever due to the decreasing amount of federal funding available, philanthropy makes a critical difference in our ability to advance medical research and patient care, providing hope and help to thousands with cancer. Thank you for ensuring that we can make a difference in the lives of patients and their families. I look forward to catching up with you again once school has ended. #

The first workstation will be located in Imaging Services in the Sibley Medical Building. More particularly, the workstation will be in Room # 65, the Reading Room dedicated to Breast Center Radiologists performing and reading needle localizations. These are for patients who are having wire placement before going to surgery in the Ambulatory Surgery Center in the Medical Office Building on the same level.

In today's digital imaging environment, a patient's images are no longer on pieces of film as in the past. Today, a patient's images are sent electronically to a radiologist's workstation. The images may originate from the operating room, another hospital or even across the country and around the world.

It is very important that a Radiologist's workstation be supportive of their specific workflow and the long hours spent in front of a computer with multiple images displayed. The **Eysis** workstation can be raised or lowered bringing the images to a perfect reading level for each Radiologist. Multiple monitors on arms can be built onto a workstation.

The Eysis workstation that is being purchased for the dedicated Mammography Radiologists at the Sullivan Center for Breast Health by the Judith A. Lese Breast Cancer Foundation will be comprised of eight monitors. Some monitors will display mammograms, some monitors will display ultrasounds, some monitors will display MRI studies. Some of the monitors will display in color and some in black and white. Additional monitors will contain a daily work list and as each Radiologist scans with a barcode scanner a unique patient identifier, the patient's images from the present day will pop up on the monitors as well as ultrasounds and mammograms from previous years in a matter of seconds. These eight monitors will be placed on the workstation for ease of reading images. They are close to one another and in the order most beneficial to a Radiologist's reading patterns. Ambient lighting with dimmer switches ease eye strain. Everything is within arm's reach on the workstation. Telephone holders allow the Radiologist to call other physicians and departments without having to move away from the patient images. Even a cup holder is provided in a secure spot.

Drs. Rebecca Zuurbier, Pouneh Razavi and Sandra Joo are eagerly anticipating the arrival of the Eysis workstations provided through the generosity of the Judith A. Lese Breast Cancer Foundation membership.
